They were built during the Spanish era and served as Spain's administrative buildings in Louisiana. They still stand today as museums that pay homage to many significant events in Louisiana's history. The Cabildo was the center of New Orleans government until 1853, when it became the headquarters of the Louisiana State Supreme Court, where the landmark Plessy v. Ferguson decision originated in 1892. The Presbytère, originally called Casa Curial or "Ecclesiastical House," was built on the residence, or presbytère, of Capuchin monks. The building was originally used for commercial purposes until 1834 when it became a courthouse. It became part of the Louisiana State Museum in 1911.
